Fenton Christmas Plates

Christmas is fast approaching and we thought we would discuss the Fenton Art Glass Company's series of handcrafted collector's plates, specifically their **Christmas in America** series. Fenton introduced the series of 12 plates in amethyst carnival iridescent glass in 1970. Interestingly, Fenton destroyed each of the molds of the plates every year to create more demand for collectors.

Beautifully designed, the plates are of historical interest. The front of each plate has the year it was made, a picture of a Church, and border consisting of holly leaves and berries. The back of the plate has a brief history of the represented Church, the Fenton trademark, and the number in the series. The following is a list of 12 plates in the series.

No. 1 Plate – **1970** "The Little Brown Church in the Vale" 1864 located in Bradford Iowa

No. 2 Plate- 1971 The old "Brick Church" built in 1631, located in Wright County, Virginia

No. 3 Plate- 1972 "The Two Horned Church" 1796, located ion Marietta Ohio

No. 4 Plate – 1973 "St. Marys of the Mountains" 1868, located Virginia City, Nevada

No. 5 Plate – **1974** "The Nation Church" 1695, located in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania

No. 6 Plate- 1975 "St. Johns Church", located Richmond, Virginia

No. 7 Plate- 1976 "The Old North Church" 1775 located in Boston, Massachusetts

No. 8 Plate- 1977 "San Carlos Borromeo De Carmelo" 1770 Carmel, California

No. 9 Plate-1978 'The Church of the Holy Trinity" 1868 located in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania

No. 10 Plate- 1979 "San Jose of Miguel De Aguayo" 1777 located in San Antonio, Texas (This plate is shown at right)

No. 11 Plate - 1980 "Christ Church" 1773 located in Alexander, Virginia

No. 12 Plate- 1981 "San Xavier de Bac" 1760 located in Tucson, Arizona
