IMPERIAL FROSTED BLOCK AND BEADED BLOCK

The Museum was very fortunate to receive a significant donation from **Terry Smith's estate** recently. Terry was an enthusiastic and prolific collector and the donation consisted of items from various companies and numerous patterns. A portion of his donation included the beautiful Imperial Glass pattern known as Beaded Block and Frosted Block #710. We will feature part of the collection in a temporary display. Come see it in person.

Frosted Block and Beaded Block are different in that the Frosted Block has stippling on the surfaces of the square block area in the pattern. The pieces called Frosted Block were Imperial's original No. 710 line. The popularity of the line caused wear on the molds and in addition to the wear they altered some of the molds to remove the stippling from the blocks, resulting in Beaded Block. They continued to call the pattern #710.

Imperial made a large line of this pattern from 1927 to 1935 in a variety of colors including green, amber, canary, blue, pink and crystal. The Beaded Block pattern was re-issued in the late 1950's to early 1980's with iridescent pink, pink, white milk glass, blue opalescent, and ice blue colors. The early pieces were not marked with the IG mark. Pieces of the white milk glass made in the early 1950's do bear the IG mark. In the 1970's , Beaded Block was reissued in pink and pink iridescent. All items produced during this time period were marked.

This Art Moderne

tumbler with Victoria Regina decoration was made by the Morgantown Glass Company in the late 1920s. It's unusual because it combines an acid-etched design and a copper wheel cutting on the same piece. It's also an example of one of Morgantown's patented "open" stems.



This "3 piece coffee and cordial set" was made by Cambridge Glass Company in the 1940s in various color combinations. The cordial glass and demitasse cup are Royal Blue; the base with ashtray center is crystal. It comes from the personal collection of late Museum member, **Terry Smith**. We thank Terry's family for donating such a unique item for our Cambridge glass display.

Barbara Shaeffer Smith

We are saddened to note the passing of Barbara Shaeffer Smith, the sixth president of the Historical Glass Museum (1996-2004). She was the daughter of founder Dixie Huckabee and the longtime publisher of the "Rainbow Review Glass Journal", whose name later changed to "Glass Digest." MORE DONATIONS



This pickle dish mounted on a chrome base was made by the Duncan & Miller Glass Company of Washington, Pennsylvania. The company's #42 pattern, introduced in 1894 and later dubbed "Mardi Gras" by collectors, was made in plain crystal, as well as in crystal with ruby staining or with gold decoration. This is one of several pieces of Mardi Gras that Duncan re-made in the 1930s in colors of that era, and is seldom seen.



This small bowl was made by the Central Glass Company of Wheeling, West Virginia in the 1930s. The ornate etched design, called Hester, includes a bird motif. The color is called Golden Sapphire. The Museum has few examples of Central glass in its collection, so this piece is a welcome addition.



This is a hard-to-find Fenton hobnail rose bowl in plum opalescent, donated by **Linda Lowe** when she visited us during the open house and Fenton seminar.

This milk glass footed cake salver in Fenton's Thumbprint pattern dates to the 1950s. It stands 5 inches high and measures a full 12 inches across -- big enough to display even a large round cake. This beautiful piece will surely be a family heirloom for the lucky buyer who gets to the Gift Shop first!
